THE CHAPEL

St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College has a beautiful Chapel situated in Xavier Wing which has been a place of prayer and worship for over 120 years. The Chapel affords a rare opportunity for students and staff of any faith or none to take some time for peace and reflection. The Blessed Sacrament is reserved in the Chapel which, for Catholics, designates this a particularly sacred space. Mass is held once a month during lunch break and all students and staff are welcome to attend or take part. Additional ecumenical services take place at key times in the academic and liturgical calendar.

PRAYER ROOM

The College has a designated gender-segregated Prayer Room where prayer mats and beads are available for staff and students to use. Like the Chapel, the College prayer room affords any member of the College community a quiet space in which to reflect and pray.

CHAPLAINCY DEPARTMENT

The Chaplaincy is an integral part of College life at St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College. Our full time Lay Chaplain provides our community with various opportunities to explore and deepen spiritual beliefs through voluntary prayer services, times of reflection, opportunities for charity work and retreats. The Chaplaincy Team also manages The Base - a social space open to every member of the St Francis Xavier community. The Base provides a safe space in which students can meet together, play games, discuss and debate issues that affect them. Working alongside the College pastoral team, our Chaplaincy Team also helps to support individuals coping with the stresses of daily life and those faced with particular challenges such as bereavement, ill health and loss.

CORE RELIGION & PHILOSOPHY

It is a requirement that all students participate in Core Religion & Philosophy for one lesson each week. This programme allows students to debate moral and spiritual matters. The programme considers a wide range of issues including relationships, justice, science and religion, along with an examination of the different faith traditions. Students also have the opportunity to reflect upon, to question and to debate matters of personal and social importance. Students complete a workbook throughout their course to receive a NOCN qualification in Theology and Religious Studies.

Our Christian mission demands that we recognise the dignity and equality of every individual. We are proud of our diversity and support one another in resisting and challenging prejudice and discrimination. We have worked closely with the National Centre for Diversity to achieve the Investors in Diversity Award. Each of our subject areas identify how they contribute to our equality and diversity objectives in their lessons and every opportunity is taken to ensure that equality and diversity themes are included in our comprehensive tutorial programme and Faculty gatherings.

WHY STUDY AT A SIXTH FORM COLLEGE?

• **Specialists** – all of our teaching, facilities and support services are specially designed for 16-18 year olds and their specific needs, and run by experts with years of experience working with this age group.

• Course choice – we can offer a much wider range of courses, that most schools simply can't deliver.

■ Independence – the experience of making that step from one institution to another will help you develop confidence, independence and maturity. Outside of lesson time we will support you to work independently, and help you manage your time, deadlines, study and workload in a way that best suits you. We treat you like an adult, and help to prepare you for your next stage of university or work.

■ A fresh start – our students relish the chance to meet a new group of like-minded people, make new friends and explore new opportunities in a fresh, campus environment.

HOW ARE SIXTH FORM COLLEGES DIFFERENT TO FURTHER EDUCATION COLLEGES?

• Peer group environment – unlike FE colleges whose intake covers all ages, you'll be in an environment with only your age group.

■ Support – the majority of sixth form colleges provide a lot of support when it comes to day-to-day learning, careers guidance and university preparation and application. We have processes in place to make sure no student falls behind, as well as tailored support for everyone's learning needs and future ambitions. This level of support means sixth form colleges have high retention rates.

■ Safety & Welfare – all our staff are trained and experienced in the issues faced by the 16-18 age group, and take the welfare of all our students seriously. Students can access support and counselling from dedicated welfare staff for both academic and personal issues.

• **Community** – sixth form colleges tend to be smaller in student number compared to further education colleges that can have up to 10,000 students, including adults. At St Francis Xavier our students are all 16-19 year olds and we have a wide range of clubs and groups that bring like-minded students together for both work and play.

WHY CHOOSE ST FRANCIS XAVIER CATHOLIC SIXTH FORM COLLEGE?

COURSE CHOICE

Unlike many other sixth forms and sixth form colleges, we offer the opportunity to take any combination of 27 A level and Level 3 Applied Diploma subjects. Students interested in vocational programmes can choose from 11 Level 3 Extended Diplomas, including BTEC and University of the Arts courses, as well as 3 T levels - the new government backed career-focused qualification for 16-19 year olds. We also offer BTEC Level 2 and Foundation options, along with GCSE maths and English language retake programmes.

OFSTED RATED 'GOOD'

St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College has been judged to be a "Good Provider" by Ofsted. Their report, published in 2018, stated:

- "Students are well behaved, tolerant and respectful of each other and their teachers"
- "Teachers are well qualified in their subject areas and use their knowledge well to deepen their students' understanding of the topics they teach"
- "Teachers give students very clear and detailed feedback on their work to enable them to understand what they need to do to improve"
- "Students show very good attitudes to learning. They have high aspirations and work well together and independently".

FACILITIES

We have an impressive array of facilities for students. The College Learning Resource Centre rivals those found in Universities and all students have free access to the well-appointed fitness suite and extensive sports facilities, including our sports hall and all-weather pitch. Students also have access to music and media studios, a reduced price Costa and the quad - our outdoor garden - for study and relaxation. Our Chapel offers space for calm reflection.

STUDENT ENRICHMENT

Student Enrichment plays an integral part in our student programme at St Francis Xavier. Examples include:

 Speakers – we have a rich programme of visiting speakers (Recent speakers have included Lord Professor Robert Winston, Cephas Williams & Chuka Ummuna) • Educational outings – these have included the Model United Nations conference in New York, a visit to the CERN particle accelerator in Switzerland and an English Literature trip to Paris.

• Sport – all students are encouraged to get involved in our sports programmes. This includes use of our amazing sports facilities such as our fitness suite, sports hall and outdoor pitch and joining our many and varied sports clubs & teams.

Clubs & Groups – we have a large number of clubs and groups, including our Student Union, with a student-elected President and Vice President representing students' needs and interests.

ACADEMIC & CAREERS SUPPORT

Our dedicated academic and careers support teams help every student reach their full potential and achieve their desired next steps. We cover the full range of support needed, from help to stay on track, to special support for Oxbridge and Russell Group applicants (see page 13) and those going on to study medicine.

PROGRESSION TO UNIVERSITY

The proportion of our students who go on to study at university is higher than many other sixth form colleges. In 2022, over 400 of our students applied to university. 92.4% of those successfully secured places and went on to study a wide variety of courses at university and higher education institutions across the country, including top third and Russell Group universities.

STUDENT SUPPORT

We have an excellent pastoral care system. Each student has a Personal Tutor to guide them alongside their subject teachers. We have a specialist welfare team, Designated Safeguarding Officer, College Counsellor and a Student Welfare Officer on hand to support students experiencing personal worries or concerns. We also have an Additional Learning Support team who are there to help students with specialist learning needs, as well as any student who is struggling academically.

CATHOLIC ETHOS

As a Catholic college we support and promote values such as kindness, inclusion and respect for everyone; we pride ourselves on having a vibrant and supportive community. We welcome every one of any faith or none. For those who want to make use of them, we have an on-site Chapel and Multi-Faith Prayer Room.

FACILITIES

St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College can offer you the very best in learning and recreational facilities. Our computer suites, science labs, drama, media and music studios and gym are furnished with all the equipment to help you succeed and have fun while you're here.

LEARNING RESOURCES CENTRE (LRC)

The Learning Resource Centre provides a physical and digital library that includes a comprehensive range of physical and digital resources (25,000 items consisting of books, DVDs, audiobooks, e-books, online databases, journals and magazines, rulers, calculators and headphones). It offers Wi-Fi access to personal mobiles, loanable iPads and laptops. It also provides 36 study cubicles (20 with power sockets), 4 quick access PCs and 70 bookable PCs. Students will find an environment conducive to individual research, dedicated to individual silent study. The LRC team offers independent learning support as well as library and research methodology seminars throughout the year. It is possible to make a booking for a class, group or individual appointment.

DIGITAL INNOVATION

St Francis Xavier is investing significantly in digital innovation. We have partnered with Apple to embed the use of digital tools and systems into our everyday learning and teaching through the use of Apple iPads and other resources. Our aim is that every student who attends St Francis Xavier, will have access to an iPad or similar digital device, which will support their learning, improve their outcomes and provide them with the digital skills necessary to enter a world of work where technology and innovation are constantly evolving.

THE FITNESS SUITE

St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College's Fitness Suite is the ideal environment to achieve your personal fitness goals. With state of the art equipment and passionate sport staff on hand for advice, you can find out your nutritional and training specific needs. The Fitness Suite boasts a wide range of equipment including treadmills, rowing machines, battle ropes and free weights. All students are welcome to use the gym for free once they have had their induction.

MUSIC RECORDING STUDIOS

The Music Studio was re-opened following a refurbishment in June 2017 by St Francis Xavier alumnus Tinie Tempah. The Music Studio can be booked out by any student, whether they are on a related course or not. Our Music Technician will work with students to assist with recording and producing music.

STUDENT ENRICHMENT

THE ENRICHMENT PROGRAMME

Our expert teachers and staff work very hard to ensure that when you come to St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College you gain a wellrounded experience both inside and outside of the classroom. We offer a huge range of activities which will complement your main programme of study along with those which offer you time to enjoy and interact with other students beyond class or tutor group. These include theatre trips, film club, mindfulness sessions, running club, badminton, table tennis, basketball, jewellery making, young enterprise club and many more. You can even audition for our Christmas production!

COURSE ENHANCEMENT

Within your chosen courses of study there are opportunities to hear from visiting speakers and to participate in educational visits both in the UK and abroad. Recently, students have visited universities to take part in competitions and taster days and museums and exhibitions to enhance the courses they study. Our Careers Department also organise internal events such as the Higher Education fair and workshops with universities to aid with applications for study following College.

SPORT

Students are encouraged to participate in our many sports programmes and facilities, including our state of the art fitness suite, sports hall and MUGA outdoor pitch. We have a large number of sports clubs and teams, including football, basketball, netball, trampolining, table tennis, badminton, weight training and Box-Fit. Students also have the chance to take part in sports trips, such as ice skating, rock climbing and Go Ape.





YOUNG ENTERPRISE

The College is proud of our Young Enterprise teams who regularly make it to the Central London final. This provides a real and genuine opportunity for all students to set up their own business and run it for a year. Students get the opportunity to present their ideas at competitions in prestigious locations.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The President and Vice President of the Student Council are elected by the students to represent their needs and interests and to contribute to the decision-making and governance of the College. Members of the Student Council serve on the governing body. The students are expected to initiate and take responsibility for many of their own activities – for example, the social programme and their contribution to the wider community through collections for charity or other awareness raising events.

MODEL UNITED NATIONS

Each year, a team of students are selected following an application process to join the St Francis Xavier Model United Nations team. They attend conferences, representing their given country in committees and debates having researched and prepared proposals. In recent years, the MUN team has travelled to New York to take part in largest and most prestigious Model United Nations conference in the world.

STUDENT SUPPORT

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Bursaries/free college meals will be available in 2023-24. These are subject to Government funding and will be assessed on an income basis. There are no tuition fees chargeable to UK residents under 19 years of age on 31st August 2023. If you are a citizen of the European Union (EU) or European Economic Area (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland), you will need to prove your residency status by providing evidence of the EU Settlement Scheme (Settled or Pre-Settled status).

ADDITIONAL LEARNING SUPPORT

If you have a learning difference such as Dyslexia, Autism Spectrum Condition or a disability, please be assured that you will receive tailor-made support from trained specialist tutors who receive continuous updates in their training. In addition to academic help, support takes the form of holistic development; the flourishing of the whole person with a key focus on developing selfesteem, confidence and independence. COLLEGE COUNSELLOR

The College Counsellor offers a professional, confidential service to all students to help them deal with difficult feelings. You can self-refer or ask your tutor to refer you. The counsellor will offer you an initial appointment to discuss the issues affecting you and to decide with you whether or not counselling can help you. Counselling is not compulsory, so you can stop at any time.

STUDENT WELFARE*

At St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College we understand that your general wellbeing is central to your academic success. Whenever you need help or advice, there is someone to turn to. We offer a confidential, dedicated service to help manage your studies and deal with any issues, questions or concerns you might have, whether they are personal, financial or practical. Some of the issues we regularly help with include the following:

- Looked after children and care leaver advice and support
- Semi/Independent living
- Homelessness
- Finance and funding
- Welfare benefits and counselling
- Health (physical and mental)

PASTORAL SUPPORT

Every student will be allocated a tutor group and your tutor will be your biggest support in the years you spend at St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College. Each tutor group belongs to a House, headed by a member of staff who is there to offer further support and guidance. The College is proud of its pastoral care and support and the dedicated team will be on call to help when it is needed.

STUDENT SAFETY

The safety and welfare of all our students is of paramount importance here at St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College. The Designated Safeguarding Officer and Safeguarding team are trained to detect and manage any issues that may arise. All members of staff and governors receive safeguarding training on a regular basis. College staff cooperate and engage with external agencies wherever necessary in accordance with legislation. Our safeguarding policies are comprehensive and available to view on our website. Through our tutorial programme and Religion & Philosophy lessons, we discuss safeguarding issues with our students to ensure that they are aware of how to keep themselves safe. This includes areas such as online safety and health. Policies and tutorials are continuously monitored and updated to address any emerging issues.

CAREERS GUIDANCE

At St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College, the Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) Programme is central to each student's programme of study and progression throughout their college education.

The CEIAG Programme is integrated into students' weekly tutorial lesson, and is designed to match students' academic progression and enhance their career plans for the future.

THE CEIAG PROGRAMME ACTIVITIES INCLUDE:

- Structured careers lessons for all students
- Booked individual careers interviews (also open to parents)
- In-house and externally organised events
- Careers workshops
- Job search and interview skills training

Students are encouraged to participate in university course taster sessions, summer schools and to go on university visits. The Careers Department builds partnerships with employers, training companies and universities to increase progression opportunities for our students.

HIGHER EDUCATION & CAREERS FAIR

This very successful event held each year in March is an opportunity for our students to meet and interact with university staff, employers and training providers. At this event, students discuss university courses, apprenticeships and other training and employment opportunities with representatives from over 40 universities and employers.





(Oxbridge, Russell Group & EPQ programme)

At St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College we believe in supporting students to exceed their potential and achieve excellence. If your GCSE results suggest you have the capability to progress to highlyselective universities then this is the programme for you.

Selected students who fulfil the criteria of an excellent GCSE score will be invited to join the Russell Group and Oxbridge Programme (REAch). Students must maintain outstanding attendance, punctuality and academic excellence throughout the year to remain on the programme. Students who are selected to follow the REAch pathway will benefit from bespoke support sessions designed to hone the skills which are sought after by the top universities. St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College has successfully supported a number of students through to top universities, including Oxford and other Russell Group universities, and you will always receive advice and mentoring that is tailored to your needs and your application. We have experts in a variety of fields to mentor and guide you through your university application from start to finish.

Being on the REAch programme will maximise your chance of progressing to a top university. You will gain an insight into the university admissions process and acquire tips, advice and feedback on all aspects of your application including personal statements. The programme also includes a range of speakers from universities, placements on university master classes, summer schools, work experience, practice interviews and visits to universities. Students applying for medical, dentistry, veterinary and healthcare degrees are additionally supported with securing work experience placements.

EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION (EPQ)

Students complete an independent research project on a topic of their choice. This qualification counts as half an A-level and will develop your critical, reflective and problem-solving skills to help support your application to university. Many Russell Group universities consider this a valuable addition to a student's UCAS application and may even lower their grade requirements for course entry. See page 72 for more information.

ACHIEVEMENT

Our REAch tutors will work with you to develop your problem solving, critical thinking and time management skills, which will support your achievement in your chosen Level 3 courses. We appreciate that the demands of A-level represent a significant step up from GCSE; we will guide you to develop the independent learning skills needed to thrive.



INFORMATION FOR PARENTS & GUARDIANS



At St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College, students have all the support they require to help them reach their potential. We guide and help them to cope with their studies through our successful pastoral system and with access to specialised support through our counselling and welfare support services.

PASTORAL SUPPORT

The College is proud of its pastoral care and support system with a dedicated team on call to help when it is needed. Each student is part of a tutor group and will find that their personal tutor is their biggest support during their time with us.

ATTENDANCE & PUNCTUALITY PROCEDURES

Our teachers lead by example by being punctual and prepared for lessons and ensuring that every lesson is a valuable experience with effective starter activities that are worth being punctual for. Teachers record attendance and punctuality accurately on the day of the lesson and follow up poor attendance and persistent lateness, involving parents and guardians when issues with attendance or lateness arise.

MONITORING & ENCOURAGING STUDENT PROGRESS

Tutors will work with both the student and their parents/carers, to maintain achievement and overcome any difficulties which may arise during their studies by:

Inviting parents/carers, to attend Progress Review evenings twice a year with their son/daughter to meet with their subject teachers and tutor to hear about how they are doing in their studies.

- Providing each student with an Individual Learning Plan (ILP); an on-going process of assessment, feedback, target-setting and review to support them in continually improving their performance in their courses
- Sending full reports to parents/carers at the end of both of the ILP periods, the Autumn and Spring terms.
- Building a positive ethos around learning, attendance, punctuality and behaviour
- Supporting students who are having difficulty with learning, behaviour, attendance and punctuality through discussion and advice

YEAR 12 HIGHER EDUCATION PARENT/CARER EVENING

The Careers Department organises an event aimed at all parents/carers of first year students which is opportunity to meet staff from several universities in our London partnership. Parents/carers will also be able to gain an insight into opportunities on offer in UK higher education institutions, and how to best prepare young people to take full advantage of their academic and career opportunities. The Careers department are always on hand for any questions about a student's next step after Sixth Form.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Bursaries/free college meals will be available in 2023-24. These are subject to Government funding and will be assessed on an income basis.

OVERSEAS STUDENTS

At St Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College we pride ourselves on the inclusive nature of the College and value the diverse backgrounds of our students.

Your student journey will be enhanced by the numerous enrichment opportunities on offer and a network of friends will help you develop academically, socially and culturally. We value the development of all aspects of the student experience and you will enjoy a crosscultural learning environment that will help you achieve your academic goals, providing a strong foundation for the years ahead, either in university or the world of work.

HOW TO APPLY

Overseas students must apply using the online application form at **www.sfx.ac.uk/apply.** When entering your qualifications please select the most similar options at GCSE and, if invited to an interview, bring along details of the course(s) you are taking and your predicted grades. Please see page 21 for more information on how to apply.

FEES

There are no tuition fees chargeable to full-time students from within the European Union for those under 19 years of age on 1st September 2019.

FOREIGN QUALIFICATIONS

If you are successful in gaining a conditional offer and have foreign qualifications (excluding iGCSEs), you will need to provide a ENIC Statement of Comparability, which gives an official comparison of your qualifications to UK qualifications (such as GCSEs). Go to **www.enic.org.uk** to make an individual application. We will not be able to enrol you unless we have this information.



RESIDENCY

If you are not a British citizen or a citizen of the European Union (EU) / of the European Economic Area (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland) with settled status, you will need to prove your residency status and entitlement to free 16-19 education. This means that during enrolment we must see the original of your passport and immigration status documents from the Home Office. If you are a citizen of the European Union (EU) or European Economic Area (Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland), you will need to prove your residency status by providing evidence of the EU Settlement Scheme (Settled or Pre-Settled status).

FLUENT SPEAKERS







COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Fine Art A Level fosters creative problem solving, independence, innovation and risk taking as well as engagement with cultural, social and political issues. Explore the world of art and design, experiment and learn through the creative visual process. You can expect to work with a broad range of media; traditional techniques such as drawing, painting, printmaking and sculpture. In year one, the focus will be exploring ideas, developing skills through the creative process, and learning from creative exploration to become visually literate and articulate. As well as developing mastery of practical skills, creative and visual learning. You will also make contextual links between your own work and that of other artists and designers through research assignments.

COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

We support learners to become highly independent, creative and self-motivated individuals. We visit a range of exhibitions and workshops throughout the course. Drawing trips to London galleries previously included; The National Portrait Gallery, The Victoria and Albert Museum and the Tate Museums. You will have the opportunity visually to explore, challenge and develop your own ideas and opinions on significant themes and issues.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

Progression to university from A Level Fine Art is high, students who wish to specialise in Art & Design typically progress on to a Foundation Diploma in Art & Design at UAL institutions, Goldsmiths University or other Universities across the country. Career opportunities include Architecture, Interior Design, Product Design, Illustration, Textile Design, Set Design, Fashion Design and many others.

The Graphic Communication A level fosters creative problem solving as well as independence, innovation, risk taking and engagement with cultural, social and political issues. You will engage in work that explores traditional formats as well as digital technologies Your knowledge and skills will grow in Illustration, branding, identity, advertising, motion graphics, interaction/UX design, whilst developing strong skills in creative thinking and ideas-led communication solutions. You will have the opportunity visually to explore, challenge and develop your own ideas and opinion on significant themes and issues.

WHERE IS THE COMMAND CENTRE?

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

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Progression to university from this course is high; students who want to advance into Art & Design typically progress through a Foundation Diploma in Art & Design and then onto undergraduate courses. Many go on to study at UAL institutions, including Ravensbourne College of Design, Manchester Metropolitan University and De Montford. Career opportunities include Animation, Video Game Design, Graphic Design, Illustration Creative director, Set Design, Special Effects Artist, Photography, Product management, Interaction design, Industrial design, editorial design and architecture.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This challenging and inspiring course approaches photography as an artistic discipline. Students explore the way they see their world as they experiment with photographic concepts and practices. Through exploration in a range of lensbased techniques and processes they engage critically with the practice of photography and address questions such as: What is photography? What is photography for? What makes a successful photograph? Photography students are encouraged to be inquisitive, flexible, spontaneous and independent in their approach to the subject. At St Francis Xavier this course is taught using digital cameras and our projects focus on still and moving photography, cameraless photography, digital editing, lighting techniques, mixed-media experimentation, installation.

COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

Class-based activities are supported by visits to exhibitions at The Photographers Gallery, Tate Galleries and more, where students can consider their own work in the context of professional photographers', artists' and designers' practices. You will have the opportunity visually to explore, challenge and develop your own ideas and opinion on significant themes and issues. These skills are highly valued at higher education and by employers.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

Progression to university from this course is high; students who want to advance into Photography, Film and Media typically progress through a Foundation Diploma and then onto undergraduate courses. The range of specialisms applied for is diverse, but may include Photography, Film & Television, Fashion, Animation, Advertising, Commercial Photography, Media & Communication, Visual Communication, Professional Photography, Photography & Digital Imaging, Creative Media Production.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Biology is the study of the natural world and will take you on a journey through life, from the macroscopic environments that drive the biodiversity we see on Earth to the microscopic world of the cell and molecular interactions.

Units:

YEAR 1

- Unit 01: Biological molecules
- Unit 02: Cells
- Unit 03: Organisms exchange substances with their environment
- Unit 04: Genetic information, variation and relationships between organisms

YEAR 2

- Unit 05: Energy transfers in and between organisms
- Unit 06: Organisms respond to changes in their internal and external environments
- Unit 07: Genetics, populations, evolution and ecosystems
- Unit 08: The control of gene expression.

Assessment:

Assessed by 3 written exams at the end of year 2 and independently assessed practical endorsement.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

Students can progress to a variety of different degrees in the biological sciences, environmental and medical fields including medicine, dentistry, veterinary medicine, physiotherapy, paramedic science, nursing, biomedical science, genetics and biochemistry. As a facilitating subject it can also lead to other numerate degrees like business studies and finance. Possible careers include research scientist, science communication, clinical scientist, environmental scientist as well as careers in the education sector. Often A level chemistry is also required for these degrees and career options.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Business A Level provides learners with a meaningful understanding of how businesses operate, develop and expand in a modern and ever changing world. In Theme 1 you will learn about dynamic markets, social media and online retailing, innovation and entrepreneurship. Theme 2 introduces you to business finance, the impact of economic uncertainty on businesses and the competitive environment. In Theme 3 you will move from functions to strategy, exploring business decision-making, small business survival, managing change and scenario planning. Theme 4 explores global business; investigating overseas markets, cultural and social differences and the impact of multinational corporations.

Units:

Theme 1: Marketing & People Theme 2: Managing Business Activities YEAR 2 Theme 3: Business Decisions & Strategies Theme 4: Global Business

Assessment:

Business Studies A level is a useful introduction to the world of business for students planning to enter professions such as banking, accountancy, management services and human resources management. It is equally beneficial for those progressing to higher education in other fields.

CHEMISTRY A level (AQA)

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Chemistry is the fascinating study of chemical ideas which are all around us and shape our lives. From the atom to the zwitterion, the concepts covered will amaze and engage you, whilst broadening your scientific understanding. You will apply mathematical understanding in a practical setting and build towards researching and designing your own experiments. All of the skills developed will prepare you for an exciting future in whatever field you choose. It is recommended to study Chemistry with Biology, and/ or Physics. It is also complemented by Mathematics.

Units:

Physical Chemistry including: atomic structure; bonding; kinetics; chemical equilibria; redox; acids and bases.

Inorganic Chemistry including: the alkaline earth metals, the halogens: transition metals Organic chemistry including: organic analysis; optical isomerism; aldehydes and ketones; polymers; amino acids, proteins and DNA; organic synthesis, nuclear magnetic resonance spectroscopy; chromatography.

Assessment:

Assessment is 100% examination-based, with twelve standard experiments being assessed and awarded independently.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

The subject is useful for a wide range of higher education courses and careers including those in the physical sciences (engineering, environmental scientist), biological sciences (biochemistry, medicine, veterinary science and other areas of healthcare) and other related scientific areas such as forensic science and chemical research. Chemistry is also a facilitating subject for other areas such as law, education and journalism.

COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

- Visit to Kingston University for a Chemistry subject insight day, including practical sessions in the undergraduate laboratories.
- Visiting speakers talk to students about various career and course related opportunities including medicine, medical sciences and healthcare.
- Former students speak to students about their successful progression to higher education and career pathways, including medicine.
- Small group tutoring sessions with Russell Group university tutors.
- Opportunity to take part in several prestigious competitive events including the Royal Society of Chemistry Olympiad exam, Cambridge Chemistry Challenge and the Royal Society of Chemistry Analyst competition.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Through The World of the Hero, students will study some of the greatest pieces of literature produced in the Ancient World: 'The Odyssey' and 'The Aeneid'. Both texts will be explored for attitudes and values of the time and to interpret what it meant to be a hero in the Classical World. The Greek Theatre unit allows students to explore the background of Western theatrical performance using art and architecture, and to engage with ancient Greek comedy and tragedy, both of which pose questions relevant to society today. The Beliefs & Ideas unit looks at the philosophy and ethics of love and relationships. Those who like a good argument will be able to consider Greek and Roman ideas related to the passions, frustrations and delights of love in the Ancient World. The ethical guestions raised by these ideas continue to be relevant and students will be able to discuss important issues surrounding love, desire, sex, sexuality and the institution of marriage.

N.B. Those considering the subject do not need to have studied it beforehand. No prior knowledge is expected.

Units:

YEAR 1: The World of the Hero: Homer's 'Odyssey'; Culture and Arts: Greek Theatre.

YEAR 2: The World of the Hero: Virgil's 'Aeneid'; Beliefs and Ideas: Love and Relationships.

Assessment:

Assessment is 100% examination based.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

Classical Civilisation complements English Literature, History, Politics, Performance Studies, Religion and Philosophy and Art. It is beneficial for careers which involve research, analysing and evaluating evidence and information, textual analysis, developing arguments and being able to spot weaknesses in assertions and independent thinking skills. Students with Classical Civilisation A level often progress to careers in Law, Politics, the Civil Service, Teaching, Public Relations and many more areas. The subject is highly regarded by universities and employers.

- Trips to universities to access talks by experts in the field.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

How do we decide what behaviour is criminal? How do we explain why people commit crime? What makes someone a serial killer, or abusive to their own families? Knowing about the different types of crime and the criminological approaches to theory will give you a sharper insight into the kind of thinking used by experts and politicians to explain crime and criminality. The Level 3 Applied Diploma in Criminology is a qualification with elements of psychology, law and sociology that complements studies in other humanity subjects. Learning is related to authentic criminal case studies.

Units:

Unit 1: Changing awareness of crime Unit 2: Criminological theories Unit 3: Crime scene to courtroom Unit 4: Crime and Punishment

Assessment:

50% coursework, 50% examination

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

Economics is an academically challenging subject that requires you to have the ability to understand complex concepts and ideas and write about differing economic theories in essay format. You must be able to combine data analysis and comprehension skills with clear, concise, grammatically accurate and well-structured essay writing skills.

You might have an interest in economics and want to know more about the impact economics has on the world around you. You might want to investigate some of the stories you hear in the news - Why do some economies grow and others don't? Why was the Brexit vote such a controversial decision economically? Why didn't economists predict the Global Financial Crisis? Does Africa have the potential of becoming the most powerful continent? And of course, what are the economic impacts of Coronavirus and national lockdown? This course will help you to understand all this and more!

Units:

Theme 1: Introduction to Markets and Market Failure Theme 2: The UK Economy- Performance and Policies Theme 3: Business Behaviour and the Labour Market Theme 4: Global Perspective

Assessment:

The course will be assessed with 3 exams at the end of year 2. Each exam requires some numerical skill as well as the ability to articulate your ideas and judgements clearly in written form.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

This subject is useful if you want to go on to study Economics or another related degree at university. Common career paths for Economics graduates include Banking and Accountancy. It is also suitable for those considering careers in most business areas, as well as law. Many students in the department go on to study Economics at a higher level.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

On this course you will read and analyse literary, non-literary and spoken language texts whilst learning to produce writing of a particular style, voice and register. You will examine all three genres (prose, poetry and drama) to consider variations and connections between texts in different forms. Works studied include "The Handmaid's Tale" and "A Streetcar Named Desire".

Units:

Unit 01: Telling Stories Unit 02: Exploring Conflict Unit 03: Making Connections

Assessment:

This A level will be assessed by two examinations and a coursework folder of investigative and analytical work.

COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

Day trip to Paris to explore the culture of the city and its influence on the anthology texts.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

A level English courses form excellent preparation for any one of the wide variety of English courses available in higher education. English literature, in particular, is considered a 'facilitating subject' by Russell Group universities. English is useful for career paths including Journalism, Law, Publishing, the Civil Service, Politics and Teaching.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

On this English course you will learn to analyse, compare and understand a variety of literary texts from all genres: poetry, drama and prose. A wide range of literary eras are represented on the course, which focuses on a balance of modern and classic texts. Students study canonical works such as Hamlet and A Doll's House along with lesser-known texts from Africa and America.

Units:

Assessment:

These A levels will be assessed by 2 examinations and a coursework folder of investigative (English Language) and analytical work.

English literature, in particular, is considered a 'facilitating subject' by Russell Group universities. COURSE DESCRIPTION

The EPQ is offered in addition to a three A Level or a level 3 Extended Diploma programme. The course provides students with the opportunity to select a topic that they are particularly interested in and conduct both primary and secondary research. It may be carried out individually or as a group and can be practical or essay based. The EPQ will develop and improve students' own performance as critical, reflective and independent learners. The course also helps develop skills such as planning, research, critical thinking, analysis, synthesis and evaluation.

Units:

Component 01: Production Log Component 02: Project Product (an essay or an artefact) Component 03: Presentation

Assessment:

Students select a topic of their choice, design and carry out research and reflect on the project process. They are required to complete an essay (between 1,000-5,000 words), logbook and presentation for formal assessment.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

The EPQ is a highly valued and respected course which is designed to enhance the student's ability to work independently through the development and utilisation of a series of academic skills, all of which are beneficial to future study and employment. For those looking to apply for university, this course provides excellent preparation for the kind of study required at degree level.

The EPQ is particularly beneficial for those applying to Oxbridge and other highly competitive universities.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The topics studied in year one of the course include a range of social issues and trends such as:

- The changes in family structures in France
- Education and the world of work.
- You will also study aspects of the political and artistic culture including: Festivals and traditions, Music, Media and Politics.

In the second year of the course you will study:

- The impacts, the challenges and the benefits of immigration on France since the XIX century.
- You will also cover WW2 and more specifically the German Occupation and the Resistance period.
- You will study a set film and a book which will be assessed through a target language essay:

You will have to carry out an independent research project which will be assessed within the Speaking exam.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The BTEC Level 3 National Extended Certificate in Applied Law is equal to one A level; this course is taken alongside two other A levels or Applied Diploma courses.

Law is an exciting and dynamic subject. Laws are rules, usually made by government, that are used to order the way in which a society behaves. Law plays an essential role in every area of our lives as well as those of organisations and institutions.

You will study key aspects of the English legal system plus areas of Criminal and Civil law, including:

- How laws are made and how the legal system works
- Police powers, law enforcement and different types of offences
- Solving disputes in civil law
- Rights and responsibilities

You will learn how to understand and apply the law to real-life situations, and develop the necessary skills of analysis, researching, understanding complex text and attention to detail.

This subject particularly complements subjects in social sciences and humanities, such as Sociology, Psychology, History, RS and Criminology. It is a 2 year course, and carries the same UCAS points as an A level, so is an excellent route into higher education.

WHAT CAN THIS COURSE LEAD TO?

A good understanding of the legal system in the UK will be an asset in any future career. You'll also develop valuable transferable skills for further study and employment, including critical analysis, research skills, following a brief, selfdirected study and working to deadlines.

The Applied Law Level 3 BTEC will particularly appeal to students interested in a career in law and the wider legal profession, as well as being relevant to careers in business, social work, probation and prison services and the police. Applied Law BTEC provides a good route into many degree courses and higher apprenticeships.

Maths is a highly respected A level that goes well with Science and/or Economics, but is also good for anyone who enjoys Maths and wants to do it to a higher level. It is a lot of work, so only choose it if you know you are good at it and enjoy problem solving.

Units:

Two thirds of the Maths A level course are Pure maths, one sixth is Statistics and one sixth is Mechanics.

Pure Maths: Includes quadratics, straight lines, calculus, trigonometry and logarithms. *Statistics:* Builds on the averages, correlation and probability distributions you have done at GCSE. *Mechanics:* How movement is affected by forces.

Assessment:

Assessment is 100% examination based. There will be three 2 hour exams. You are allowed a calculator in all exams.

COURSE HIGHLIGHTS

- We enter students each year for the UK Senior Maths Challenge. The top four then represent Saint Francis Xavier Catholic Sixth Form College at the UK Team Challenge.
- Visiting speakers from university maths departments.
- Trips to university Maths Days and Maths Lectures at the London Mathematical Society.

For many of us Mathematics extends into our chosen profession: Civil Servants need to analyse data, Economists need to recognise financial trends, Engineers need to take account of stress patterns in physical materials. This subject is useful if you want to go on to study Maths, Engineering, Computing, Economics or a science at degree level. It can also be beneficial for research-based subjects, such as Psychology, or subjects involving Business and Finance. Maths is a highly desirable subject to employers in most fields of employment.

A Level Media Studies offers learners the opportunity to develop a thorough and in depth understanding of how the media shapes our perception of the world, using a comprehensive theoretical framework to support critical exploration and reflection, analysis and debate.

The course provides learners with the tools to develop a critical understanding and appreciation of the media through four inter-related areas:

Media language: how the media through their forms, codes, conventions and techniques communicate meanings

Representation: how the media portray events, issues, individuals and social groups

Industries: how the media industries' processes of production, distribution and circulation affect media forms and platforms

Politics students develop knowledge and understanding of contemporary political structures and issues in their historical context, both within the United Kingdom and globally. They have a critical awareness of the changing nature of politics and the relationships between political ideas, institutions and processes. Students understand the influences and interests which have an impact on decisions in politics and an understanding of the rights and responsibilities of individuals and groups. Politics students have the skills to critically analyse, interpret and evaluate political information to form arguments and make judgements and they develop an interest in, and engagement with, contemporary politics.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Psychology is the scientific study of human behaviour and experiences, where we look to explain why people are the way they are. The course aims to extend our everyday observations of human behaviour by attempting to explore the truth behind what is 'known' scientifically. Psychology also examines how to help treat individuals who suffer from various psychological disorders, and the different ways one can go about this. Most of Psychology is literature based, however, there are sizable science and mathematical elements.

Units:

Unit 01: Social influence, Memory, Attachment and Psychopathology

Unit 02: Approaches in Psychology, Biopsychology and Research Methods

Unit 03: Issues and debates in Psychology, three optional topics (Previous topics have included: Gender, Schizophrenia, Relationships, Addiction & Forensic Psychology)

The topics in year 2 are chosen democratically in year 1 in a vote, so Psychology students determine what optional topics they study.

Assessment:

The A level course is 100% examination based through three papers which are two hours each. All papers include multiple choice, short answer and extended writing questions (16 marks).

A Psychology degree has been widely regarded as one of the most versatile degrees when trying to access the job market after university. This subject is very useful if you want to go on to study Psychology, Counselling, Youth Work, International Relations, Politics, Business or other Social Sciences at degree level.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Pearson BTEC Level 3 National Extended Certificate in Applied Psychology is equal to one A level. This subject is taken alongside two other A levels or Level 3 Extended Certificate subjects. In this course of Applied Psychology, you will learn all about the human mind and human behaviour. You will examine what makes us who we are and why and how we form decisions. Many units in psychology will increase your understanding of the world and people around you. Not just focusing on mental disorders and mental health, Applied Psychology will help you understand what to do to facilitate good mental health. There is another important unit in Applied Psychology where you will discover how to conduct psychological research and check that other research is accurate. In addition to these units there are optional units where you can choose Criminal and Forensic Psychology tailor making the course to what you wish to study. Applied Psychology differs from A level Psychology not just because Applied Psychology has a coursework element (in addition to exams), but because 'applied' means that you learn psychology not in theory, but in application to real life, helping you understand the people and societies we live in today.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

In RS we cover some of life's most fundamental Philosophical questions: Is the world we are living in real? What happens when we die? Does God exist? If God is loving and powerful, then why does God allow suffering? It also guestions society: Is Religion sexist? Can medical ethics ever allow someone to end their own life? Do big businesses have a responsibility to society? Finally, we look more closely at one Religion - Christianity or Hinduism and see how it developed, examine key ideas from different perspectives, and see what it looks like in a modern world. You will examine all of these issues in an analytical way, whilst developing key debating and critical thinking skills. You do not have to belong to a religion to enjoy this course, nor have studied RS at GCSE, you just need to be interested and full of auestions.

In the second year of the course you will learn:

- Impact of Immigration in Spain
- History: 'The Two Spains: 1936 onwards'.
- You will study a set film and book which will be assessed through a target language essay for paper 2:

Film: El Laberinto del Fauno by Guillermo Toro

Book: La Casa de Bernarda Alba by Federico García Lorca

You will have to carry out an independent research project which will be assessed within the Speaking exam.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is for those students who are serious about pursuing a career in the creative industries. Year 1 helps students progress by exploring the creative processes and developing creative practices. This culminates in the major project which is responding to a set brief. In year 2 they start by researching a specific industry practice and technical skills development leading to a specialist creative outcome.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The UK is regarded as a world leader in engineering fields such as renewable energy, space, aerospace, creative industries, automotive and civil. Over 5.5 million people work in the UK engineering sector and skilled engineers are in high demand. This course allows learners to develop the knowledge, understanding and skills required for progression into a range of roles within the industry using relevant software throughout the course. 

COURSE DESCRIPTION

BTECs are well established and highly successful alternatives to general qualifications, suitable for a wide range of learners and designed to accommodate the needs of employers as well as allowing progression to university. The Pearson BTEC Level 3 National Extended Diploma in Applied Science Medical profile is best suited to students wishing to progress to HE in the applied science sector. Traditionally, our students choose to study Biomedical Sciences, Biochemistry, Radiology, Physiotherapy, Nursing and Midwifery.

This is a full two-year programme equivalent to three A Levels. The course is designed to provide experience of activities carried out by scientists. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a 2 year course equivalent to 3 A Levels. Learners will spend 80% of their time in the classroom and 20% in industry placements (a minimum of 315 hours or 45 days).


